Note: Reading the textbook is not a substitute for class attendance! The reading, TSN in particular, is very detailed, and the meetings will provide the main points of focus. Also, phonetics is a hands-on subject that is virtually impossible to learn from books only.

Evaluation

The evaluation of the module is based on:

- A midterm written examination (weight 1/3) (Wednesday, 7 March)
- An oral examination at the end of the course (weight 2/3); (weeks 20-22, 14-29 May)

Other written work

Apart from the above tasks, which are evaluated and count towards your final mark, the following written work will be distributed during the course:

- Exercises in phonemic transcription (weekly onwards)
- Three written assignments (posted two weeks before each deadline)

The exercises are not evaluated, but are meant to give you a chance to practise and learn from your mistakes. It is very important that you do them, as they give you the practice necessary for completing your course successfully. The transcriptions will appear on Canvas, and a key for each one will appear the following week along with the next one. The written assignments, on the other hand, are evaluated. You must pass them to be able to sit the exam.

Canvas and handouts

As with other courses, Canvas will be used as a medium of communication, and you should check the course page as well as Oliver Traxel's homepage on a regular basis. The handout for each week will be posted a week before each seminar.
